September 15: <u>Grade 4-6 and Grade 3/4 Class</u> 8:45 am -9:00 am: students arrive and go directly into the school and are directed to their classrooms. <u>JK/SK</u> students are brought to the Kindergarten fence and met by teacher. <u>Grade 1-3</u> and <u>Grades 7 & 8</u> are in the large school yard and stay in their boundary and wait for the bell to ring, line up outside and will be met by a teacher to bring into the school.

September 16-onwards: all students arrive 8:45 am-9:00 am, stay in the large school yard in their boundary and wait for the bell to ring, line up outside and be met by a teacher who leads students into the school. Kindergarten students go to the Kindergarten fenced area.

*if it is inclement weather on any of the staggered entry days, we will follow inclement weather procedures, in that <u>all</u> students come into the building, social distancing and go directly to their classrooms.

Safety Reminders:

Ensuring that we are providing a safe environment for all students both within, outside, and coming to and leaving from school is our shared responsibility. School staff will follow specific safety protocols to ensure your child's safety and we would ask that parents also adhere to the safety practices outlined below.

Parents who walk or drive their children to school are asked to say their good-byes before the children enter the school yard. In addition to fostering a sense of independence, this routine affirms the school's safety protocol that the only people in the school yard are the supervising teachers.

Parents of Kindergarten students are asked to bring their children directly to the Kindergarten yard between 8:45am and 9:00am.

-school doors are locked at 8:45 am, please come to the front doors and buzz for entrance with your child if you arrive after 9:00am, a late slip will be provided

-When dropping off or picking up your child at school, please use the designated parking area. The school parking lot is very busy, it is recommended that you use the church parking lot and walk your child(ren) to the school yard area.

Parent Parking: Visitor parking spaces are marked with appropriate signage and are for the general use of parents and / or other visitors to the school throughout the day. The number of 'visitor' parking spaces is limited. Please do not use 'visitor parking' to drop off/pick up your child. Parking is generally available at the Church and on side-streets. Please be a good neighbor and obey the road signs and times indicated.

Kiss N' Ride: On the east side (by the Church), there is staff parking and student drop-off area. SAFTEY FIRST—single lane of traffic only, stay to the right side. When students are droppedoff, they should proceed directly to the school yard. Do not pass other vehicles in the drop-off area as students exit vehicles. Patience and cooperation ensures student safety. There is NO PARKING in the Kiss N' Ride. Please do not use the visitor parking to drop your child off in the morning. This creates a dangerous situation and impedes the flow of traffic in the Kiss N' Ride area. If you plan to walk your child to the school yard, please park at the Church or on a sidestreet and walk to the school along the sidewalk.

Bus Loop Shared with German Mills P.S.: We share a one-way bus loop with our neighbouring school German Mills P.S. The Bus Loop is for German Mills staff (parking), German Mills student drop-off, and school buses for both our schools. Please do not drive/park in the BUS LOOP area before or after school.

Morning Supervision and Dismissal:

School yard supervision begins each morning at **8:45am** in the school yard. Unless students are registered in the *Before and After Program*, they **MUST NOT be dropped-off early**, as there is no teacher supervision. Students are dismissed at 3:30pm, and should depart from the school grounds promptly and follow their pre-arranged after-school routine (B & A Program, bus, walk home, parent pick up, etc.,) If a student is not picked up at 3:30, he/she should come directly to the office.

Your child's safety and that of all of our students depends on everyone's cooperation. Thank you for your support.

Effective Use of Our Resources

Student Transportation:

Important reminder for families of students who qualify for bussing at St. Michael Catholic Academy. If your child does not qualify for bussing, please ignore this message.

Welcome to a new school year.

Please go to <u>www.schoolbuscity.com</u>, click on "Find Your Bus Stop" and follow the instructions. You may also find this information on the YCDSB website, <u>https://www.ycdsb.ca/</u> go to the bottom of the page and click on "Student Transportation" and click on <u>www.schoolbuscity.com</u> Alternate arrangements for your child's pick up from school must be communicated to their teacher/office. This includes, before and after care, parent pick up or other people picking up your child.

Parent Responsibilities:

The following is a list of responsibilities for parents. The information is a guide to ensure students safe travel to and from school.

*JK, SK and Grade 1 students must be met at the bus stop by a responsible person.

Student Transportation Services of York Region, (STSYR), has developed a new Safety Program page for parents and students on the <u>www.schoolbuscity.com</u> website which provides access to valuable safety information.

* Parents should understand the need to make alternative arrangements for their child/children if the school bus is late.

* Parents should arrive at the bus stop 5 minutes prior to the regularly scheduled pick-up and drop-off times (10 minutes during the first week of school).

* Parents should know their child/children's route number.

* Parents should know their child/children's bus stop location.

* Parents should know the school (St. Michael Catholic Academy: 905-889-4816) and bus company (First Student: 905-770-1866) phone number in the event of an emergency.

* Parents are reminded to refer to the Late Bus Report on the Student Transportation Services website at <u>www.schoolbuscity.com</u> prior to leaving for the bus stop in the mornings and afternoons.

Administration of Medication: If your child requires prescription/non-prescription medication, check with your doctor about the possibility of prescribing medication that could be taken before school and/or after your child returns home. If your child is required to take medication at school, it is the YCDSB's policy that parents submit a completed Administration of Medication Form to the school with the medication. Do not send medication to school without notifying the school and completing the form. Medication is kept at the office. (Policy 207A 207B)

Emergency Contact Forms

Please take the time to ensure that the information on the Emergency Contact form is accurate and current. With the beginning of a new school year, there is a lot of student data that requires inputting into our system to ensure the safety of all of our students. Your support is greatly appreciated! Once received, please return all forms as soon as possible.

Effective Use of Our Resources

Pediculosis (Head Lice) Policy 210

The York Catholic District School Board recognizes concerns related to pediculosis (head lice) at the school and community level. Pediculosis (head lice) are not a public hazard, as they do not cause illness, but they are a nuisance. To prevent pediculosis (head lice) from becoming a problem at our school we all need to work together. Please check your child's head on a regular basis for lice or nits. If you do find lice or nits, you must contact the office so that we can notify other parents in your child's class to keep a special watch for any signs of head lice.

A student's readmission to school is contingent upon the Parent/Guardian submitting a completed and signed "Pediculosis Treatment Form" communicating to the Principal that treatment for pediculosis (head lice) has been administered.

More information on the identification, treatment and prevention of pediculosis (head lice) from the Canadian Pediatric Society (<u>http://www.caringforkids.cps.ca/handouts/headlice</u>) and Toronto Public Health (toronto.ca/health) is available on the school's website. A hard copy of the information posted on the school's website will be provided by the Principal if requested by the Parent/Guardian.

School Communication to parents related to Policy 206: Protection of Students with Asthma

In accordance with the Act to Protect Pupils with Asthma (Ryan's Law : Ensuring Asthma Friendly Schools, 2015) the Board approved a new policy # 206: Protection of Students with Asthma at its June 21st Board Meeting. The York Catholic District School Board recognizes that there are some students within the school system who have a diagnosis of asthma which could be life threatening. The York Catholic District School Board also recognizes that asthma management is a shared responsibility among students, parents, caregivers and the entire school community.

It is the responsibility of parent(s)/guardian(s) to advise the school immediately upon registration and/or when in receipt of a diagnosis of asthma. It is also the responsibility of parent(s)/guardian(s) to ensure that all medical information pertinent to their child's diagnosis of asthma is always current.

If your child has a diagnosis of asthma please contact the school office immediately so that the appropriate forms are completed and school records are up to date in accordance with Policy 206.

Thank you for your immediate attention to this request and your ongoing support in the shared responsibility for asthma management in our school. Please refer to the Board's website for more information related to Policy 206.

The Protection of Anaphylactic Students Policy 209: The York Catholic District School Board has a comprehensive policy for students with life threatening allergies. As outlined in the policy, parents are asked to inform the school of such allergies immediately and are required to fill in specific forms with yearly updated photos, which are available in the office. Parents are required to provide the school with two (2) up-to-date, single-dose applications of Epinephrine auto-injector. We ask that NO PRODUCTS be brought into the school that may contain nut products such as peanut butter, certain types of candy bars, cookies, etc. Please be sure to read all label ingredients. Fresh vegetables, fruit, 'no nut' granola bars, raisins, etc., make great snacks for your child(ren). Thank you for your cooperation.

Unacceptable dress code items:

The following items are not part of the school uniform and therefore, not permitted (with the exception of Civvies Day if noted):

- jeans, t-shirts (exception on Civvies Day)
- leggings/yoga pants (exception on Civvies Day, student must wear a top that covers thigh area)
- cargo pants, track pants (exception on Civvies Day)
- sandals, flip flops, boots (Uggs, work boots), crocs (not permitted)
- make-up/jewelry is not encouraged but if worn by intermediate students should be minimal
- shoulder straps narrower than three fingers, tops that reveal midriff
